From the Headmaster

The year 2001 has been full of the ups and downs that are part and parcel of life in a big vibrant school.

Our roll remains at about the 1200 level with a record number of 309 Form 3 (Year 9) boys and about 300 on the books for next year. These reflect most positively on the community's perception of the school. The staff and Board of Trustees must take great heart from this, but at the same time not sit on their hands. We must continue to move forward educationally, but take with us the traditions that impact on our unique culture. You will be pleased that great importance is placed on standards and values that seem to be lacking in many sections of our communities. I am continually worried about the



"blame" mentality that we seem to have evolved in New Zealand where more talk is on rights and individuals rather than personal and collective responsibility.

It is a worrying trend that of course permeates to the values of many young people and their families. We are certainly working to ensure that our boys take responsibility for the way they act and assist them in every way we can to give them the range of skills needed for future success. In this I remain totally committed to our young people who give me great confidence in our future as a nation.

This year we have achieved some outstanding results in our co-curricula programme of sports, culture and music. From the 1st XV reaching the last 8 of NZ rugby knockout to the concert band taking the silver medal at the NZ concert band festival. We put great store on providing opportunities for all boys, no matter how big, small, slim or otherwise, to gain employment and pleasure. The holistic approach to developing the 'all rounder' is a reality but relies on many people. It requires a dedicated, willing, enthusiastic and committed group of staff, parents, old boys and senior boys to make it work. Without their goodwill and sacrifice we would not be able to talk so proudly on what has been achieved.

The last few months has seen a number of Old Boys' functions around the North Island. Napier, Rotorua and Palmerston North Super 8 games provided the ideal platform for meetings - it is always great to meet with you and share your feelings for our school. One of the most successful functions was the reunion of the 1961 1st XV with 'Squib' Henderson at the helm again - there was much merriment, story telling, lies, half-truths and most probably, some full truths as well. I see this type of reunion as wonderful fun and the way forward, in terms of Old Boy contact. Later this year we have another reunion in Auckland, next year - at school from 1937-45 and the 1962 1st XV and Rowing 8.

Old Boy events do not happen without the extraordinary dedication of a few individuals - they are conduits and the sparks required to get things rolling and take some responsibilities for maintaining the momentum - the Dick Stills', Max Strawbridge's, Max Carroll's, Graeme Earl's, Bob McCaw's, John Symes', John McIntyre's and so many others.

Men like Jack West - he has left behind a legacy of service, of commitment to NPBHS that would be hard for anyone to equal. Max Carroll has said it all in his obituary in this edition of 'Through the Gates' but I would like to add that the school is much richer for the selfless dedication of Jack West. He is the epitome of a past generation that were not consumed by the trappings of materialism and self-serving ideals, but had a calling to give service to an institution that they held dearly - in this case, NPBHS - we are all grateful that he did so. I was privileged also to know Jack for the past six years and to feel at first hand his passion for the school and its institutions - he was my source of intelligence on so many matters involving old boys of the school. He made a difference that could not be measured easily.

Finally, I thank the Old Boys who have made me feel so welcome wherever I have travelled and those who have seen fit to contribute in a monetary way to the school appeal. Your generosity will be well used in the school and I hope that others will see their opportunity to continue in their own way in the future.

IN THE NEWS

Ross Allen: at school 1942 - 44

After a long and distinguished contribution to local government in Taranaki Ross was this year named as a Companion of the Queen's Service Order (QSM) for public service.

For the past twenty-seven years Ross has served on many local body committees and councils and has been Chairman of the Taranaki Regional Council since 1989 and Chairman of the former Taranaki County Council for six years before the change. He is not seeking re-election to the TRC.

Ross has supported a variety of community and sporting organisations, including the former Tourism Taranaki and the Taranaki Business Development Board. During the 1950s and 60s Ross made a significant contribution to Taranaki cricket as an umpire, a selector, and as an administrator.

Jack West

(23.06.1914 - 09.03.2001) At school 1927 - 1931

Few men, if any, have made a greater contribution to New Plymouth Boys' High School than Jack West. He held office in a variety of posts surrounding the Old Boys' Association and the school administration and to all he brought a wealth of integrity, understanding, humour, and experience.

Within the Old Boys' Association Jack held the positions of Secretary and Chairman, was voted a life member, and was for a period, the Patron of the Association (to my knowledge the only person other than a Headmaster to hold this position). As a member of the Centennial Committee Jack worked tirelessly and extremely methodically as our registrar, and by his example kept all of us on the committee on our toes and mindful of deadlines. Jack was later to serve as a Trustee of the Centennial Fund which he had been



largely responsible for setting up. For a time Jack served on the Board of Governors and was Chairman of the Hostel committee.

Those of us who have read his book "Lest we Forget", which records the exploits of those Old Boys who fell in World War II, will be in awe of the time and effort Jack must have devoted to this self imposed labour of love. His gift will endure and is a fine testament to Jack's extraordinary service to NPBHS.

I am one who feels privileged to have had the opportunity to work on committees with Jack West.



John W Ewart

(1909 - 31.07.2001) At school 1923 - 1926

Born in Wellington in 1909, John was educated at NPBHS and then later at Canterbury University where he was awarded the NZ Diploma in Horticulture. He then travelled to England where he completed the Diploma course of three years at the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew, and then prior to the outbreak of World War 2, he served a further year at the Berlin Botanic Gardens and was appointed Assistant Curator of the Singapore Botanic Gardens and later worked in both Straits Settlement and Penang, Malaysia, where he was appointed Curator.

Always interested in sport, John played rugby for NZ Universities, cricket and football at club level in England, and later, in Malaya played inter-state rugby and cricket,



He retired to Tauranga in 1957 where he grew carnations commercially and carried out valuable development and propagation in the then fledging avocado industry. He was for many years a Member of the NZ Institute of Foresters, the International Dendrology Society, Secretary of the Singapore Gardening Society and Vice President of the NZ Society. He was a Charter member of the Otumoetal Rotary Club.

John is survived by his wife Mary, whom he married in Wanganui in 1942, two sons, one daughter and eight grandchildren.

Our new Board of Trustees

Earlier this year the elections for the school's Board of Trustees was held. NPBHS was fortunate to have a very strong field of candidates who stood for election. In all there were 15 excellent candidates - some from the previous Board and plenty of good calibre new hopefuls. This is surely an indication of the strength of the school community when we can attract a large field of strong candidates for the Board elections while other schools struggle to attract sufficient candidates to hold an election.

The successful candidates were Warren Batchelar, Murray Cochrane, Marilyn Davies, Meryn Feather, Stephen Harrop, Rob Mills and Stuart Trundle. John Warner was re-elected as staff representative and James Annabell is the newly elected student representative. Their sound considered advice has helped steer the school into its present strong position. Worthy of special note is

the work of Geoff Ward who retired this year as Chairman of the Board of Trustees. Geoff has given many years of service to NPBHS and has been involved in almost all aspects of supporting the school. His contributions to the school are many and varied and I acknowledge his input and support.

With the new Board established and settled in, we are now getting into the business end of being a trustee. There are undoubtedly challenges ahead and not the least of which is the development of the hostel and some redevelopment of the school buildings with the Gully Pavilion on our list of objectives. As with most others in the education sector however, we continue the struggle to perform miracles with insufficient resources and this is a significant hurdle to future developments. On a more positive note however, three new classrooms have recently been completed providing additional space for commerce and art classes.

In addition to the physical challenges is the challenge of maintaining the excellent academic results with the National Certificate of Educational Achievement (NCEA) to be implemented next year. The new Board of Trustees maintains the expectation of high achievement in all areas of development for our young men. NPBHS has a proud tradition of developing well rounded young men with good life skills and the Board of Trustees supports the management of the school to achieve this.

Senior Students from decades past

Following on from the March newsletter, where we profiled students from 1931, 1941 and 1951, we now bring you profiles of school leaders from 1961, 1971, 1981, and 1991.

Our sincere thanks to those old boys who have contributed these valuable insights into their time spent 'Through the gates'.

Glenn Rush, Head Day Boy 1961



Standing on the seventh form balcony at assembly in 1961 and singing that familiar song, "Forty Years On" seemed an impossibly distant prospect. Looking back, the memories are many and vivid. If I had to choose one that has stayed powerfully with me it would be the sight of Noel (Hoppy) Lynch (Music Master and Rowing Coach) walking about the school engaged in conversation (presumably about rowing) with John (JJ) Stewart, who needs no introduction. For me, Noel exemplified the notion that to have both a passion for the performing arts and a passion for sport was as natural as breathing. He kindly loaned me his oboe for my years at school. I thought of his fine baritone this week while rehearsing Falstaff with the Chapman Tripp NZ Opera Company Chorus. I have been a member of the chorus for

the past two years.

Having studied the traditional maths and science combo at school I set out to become a metallurgical engineer at Otago University but decided after two years that it was not the career I wanted. I rode a surfboard for a year before heading for Auckland where I eventually completed a degree in Mathematics. This led to a position as a statistician within the Auckland City Council Town Planning Dept where my good friend from NPBHS Tom Fookes, was starting a career as a

geographer/ town planner. Attempting to analyse some of the valuable data accumulated during the De Leuw Cather Transportation Study of Auckland in 1963 (and sensibly stored on 130,000 punch cards in a basement loc at the Auckland Regional Authority) inevitably led to my developing skills in computer programming. This quickly led to a position with IBM in 1969 where I worked as a Systems

Engineer until 1975. After IBM I tutored in Computer Studies at the Auckland Technical Institute, eventually setting up a Software Support Business for the burgeoning IBM mini computer market. I sold my share of the business in 1982 and since then have enjoyed a variety of management positions in systems development and client services for various companies within NZ.

My family is enormously important to me. I met my wife Glenis in Auckland in 1965 and settled in Titirangi amongst the wild and beautiful Waitakeres, a perfect place to bring up our four daughters with the magnificent surf of Piha close by. My daughters shared my passion for swimming and in supporting their development as young athletes I become involved in swimming administration. I was appointed Venue Director for the 1990 Commonwealth Games Swimming, a marvellous sporting festival, the memory of which I shall always treasure.

The past decade has been a time of extremes. The joyous occasions of two daughters marrying have been tempered by tragedy. My youngest daughter, Andrea, survived a shark attack in Vanuatu in 1992 which left her with permanent leg injuries. In 1994 my wife Glenis was diagnosed with ovarian cancer which she fought bravely but eventually succumbed to twenty months later. It was my love of singing and theatre that has helped me cope with that loss. These days I live in Wellington with my new partner Pauline. The recent births of my first two grandchildren have provided a rich new experience, and I look forward to the coming years with enthusiasm.

John Bone, Head Boy 1981

It is nearly twenty years since I passed through the gates. I have fond memories of the tradition and physical environment that is Boys' High. My time there is marked by a significant friendship, masters of character or colour and all the angst that manifested under the guise of punk rock but was merely the hormonal course we all run through those emerging years.

The thing about Boys' High is its physical beauty and juxtaposition to that beautiful mountain. Nothing will ever surpass the Gully ground as an arena of history and atmosphere for playing out boyhood ambitions of being an All Black or similar.



Of the masters, I remember Lyn Bublitz for his consistency, compassion and never-ending sense of appropriateness when it came to meteing out justice. I could not pass through the school without having Tom Ryder make an impression on me. In fact, speaking of impressions, I even opted as Head Boy, for him to cane me for a free period or two. Unfortunately my mana was not enhanced by the offer to be whacked, as Tom came up with some cunning alternative which was more time consuming and tedious to boot. I remember Tom for his energy and passion. His vision for a school that was strong in sport, arts and academia was a driving force for bringing the school back from the wilderness. Fish was present in my earlier years at the school and whilst not ever having been taught by the legend, I did suffer the odd fingernail inspection. As a fourth former, I recall a witless fellow classmate who managed to accidentally screw a tap off the sink in the old science block mid-class. As I remember the old block had quite good pressure.

In my seventh form, we enjoyed a healthy relationship with our peers at Girls' High (believe it or not, I married the Head Girl of the same year... we did manage nearly a decade apart before taking the plunge). During that year we managed to reinstate the school ball and take each other's assembly, each dressed in the attire of the host assembly on April Fools' Day.

Since leaving the school, I went to Massey University and completed a BSc in Botany. On moving to Auckland to pursue sailing recreationally, I fell into the chemical industry where I spent the best part of ten years in various sales and marketing roles with several organisations, including Ciba-Geigy, Robert Bryce & Co and BP Chemicals. During that time I also spent 16 months abroad completing my OE, largely in the US and UK. On my return to NZ I completed a Diploma in Business in Marketing at Auckland University.

Thankfully some things never change:


- · I still want to tell students to pull their socks up.


- 5 years at Walkato University. Double degree and a Diploma in Teaching.


